Network events will be listed on the outgoing message. If you are looking for spur-of-the-moment paddling partners leave a message on the Newsline, follow the instructions below, and members will be able to retrieve your message.

~Only leave messages that you want to be retrieved by other members. ~Be sure to leave your name, phone # and the date you'd like to paddle. ~Messages will be erased every Monday.

•To retrieve messages left on the newsline <u>dial 952</u> after the outgoing message.
•To review/rewind during message playback <u>press 7</u> and hold down until you have rewound the desired amount.
•To by-pass the outgoing message first <u>press any #</u>, then leave a message OR <u>dial 952</u> to listen to the incoming messages.
•To replay messages <u>Press 2</u>.

### PADDLING TALES

#### Cape Elizabeth to Land's End

Denny Harnish and I are driving to Bailey Island, to leave the van at Land's End, where today's trip will end. Another one of those trips where we drive 120 miles in order to paddle 12 miles. From mid-span on the Cribstone Bridge, the predawn chill disappears, as we see the sun rising over a very flat expanse of waste between us and Cape Small. When we arrive at Land's End, we agree that seeing the sun rise from the bridge is a good omen and head back up the road for Cape Elizabeth, where Mike Kearney is waiting.

As we gear up at Ship Cove, looking out at the lake-like sea, we decide to change our plans. Originally, we were going from here to Junk of Pork, then Jewell, Eagle, and finally Bailey Island. The glassy water, the warming air, the lack of wind, and a high, thin cloud cover lure us into a change of plans - a straight run to Halfway Rock and then to Bailey Island.

As we are paddling leisurely for a while, we keep noticing Halfway Rock has not increased in size at all. About a mile off Junk of Pork, Denny yells "Whatel" "Where?" "To the right." We can't see anything, but the water has been disturbed. We start squeaking on our boats to let it know our position. Volia' - a 25' Minke whale surfaces 20 feet from us, checking us out. We hang out for 15 minutes hoping for another visit, but no luck. Someone mentions food, and we reluctantly paddle on to the Rock.

Landing there is a challenge, as the smoothest ledge has all sorts of snargs sticking out of it - remnants of an old life boat ramp. We land, get food and clothing out, check out the resident seals, take pictures, and go have lunch in the lee of the lighthouse. In the lee? Oh yeah - forgot to mention - clouds have lowered, and it's blowing!

"Leisure" is not the word to describe lunch or anything else during the rest of the day. We eat, repack boats, and get on the water, thinking we're going to circumnavigate the Rock. After catching some air, we turn around and regroup in the lee of the Rock. It feels better here and looks like a good run to Bailey Island, although we will have to do a bit of a ferry angle to hit it just right.

We paddle out of the lee, and we're into it - 6 - 8 toot seas, heading right into Bailey Is. It's great surfing, wallowing, rising up - over and over. We're trying to keep close together, enough to be able to assist each other, but not run each other down. Lots of grins, a few anxious moments here and there, and 45 minutes after leaving Halfway Rock, we're at Land's End.

## BOOX REVIEW

#### The Kayak Shop: Three Elegant Wooden Kayaks Anyone Can Build by Chris Kulczycki, Ragged Mountain Press, an imprint of McGraw-Hill, Inc.

When Bill Ridlon sent me "The Kayak Shop" by Chris Kulczychi to read and review, I was pleasantly surprised. For one, as a subscriber to both Sea Kayaker and Fine Woodworking, I had seen some of Chris Kulczychi's designs and followed his thinking about the natural marriage between wood and kayaks.

The second surprise was on page 1 of Chapter 1. "My" Pygmy 19 designed by John Lockwood, (kit built in 1987) was front and center. Chris has beautifully explained the wood kayak philosophy; and has refined some building and design techniques. However, the Pygmy 19 will become a classic for John Lockwood; perhaps like the Model A Ford?

Chapter by chapter Chris unfolds the basics and nitty-gritty of design, materials, tools, and plans, without getting so technical as to scare off the prospective builder. It is a soft sell that should encourage a lot of people to make the go-for-it decision. Then, he follows up with step-by-step photos and descriptions that should keep even basic woodworkers comfortable with what they are doing.

If the reader gets the book, reads it and never builds a boat, he/she has still made a gain. A wood kayak can be purchased or built from a kit with professional help. It will be lighter, stronger, and aesthetically pleasing, relative to its various plastic cousins.

Since 1983 I've purchase and paddled six fiberglass sea kayaks of various designs. I still have three of them but my one wooden boat gets most of the use. I wish Chris had written his book ten years ago. It might have saved a lot of trouble and expense for me and others!
